All Jewish religious observances begin on the evening before the date indicated on conventional calendars and conclude the subsequent evening.

All dates in blue are Holy Days: Expect some Jewish students/employees to be absent.

Some Jews will not participate in events during Shabbat. Hanukkah and Purim do not require an absence from school or work.

ROSH HASHANAH  Jewish New Year	This two-day observance is the first of the High Holy Days, marking the beginning of the New Year and a ten-day period of atonement and spiritual renewal. Extended synagogue services are held.  Please avoid scheduling special events on the evening before, or on these days. Some denominations of Judaism observe only the first day of Rosh Hashanah. Almost all Jewish students and employees will be absent at least one day. PURIM Festival of Esther	Purim celebrates the salvation of the Jews of ancient Persia, through the help of Queen Esther, from a plot to destroy them. The celebration of Purim begins the evening before in synagogue with the reading of the Megillah, or Book of Esther.  Please avoid scheduling special events on the eve of Purim. This is an eight-day observance with work restrictions on the first two and last two days.  Some Jewish employees and students may be absent.
